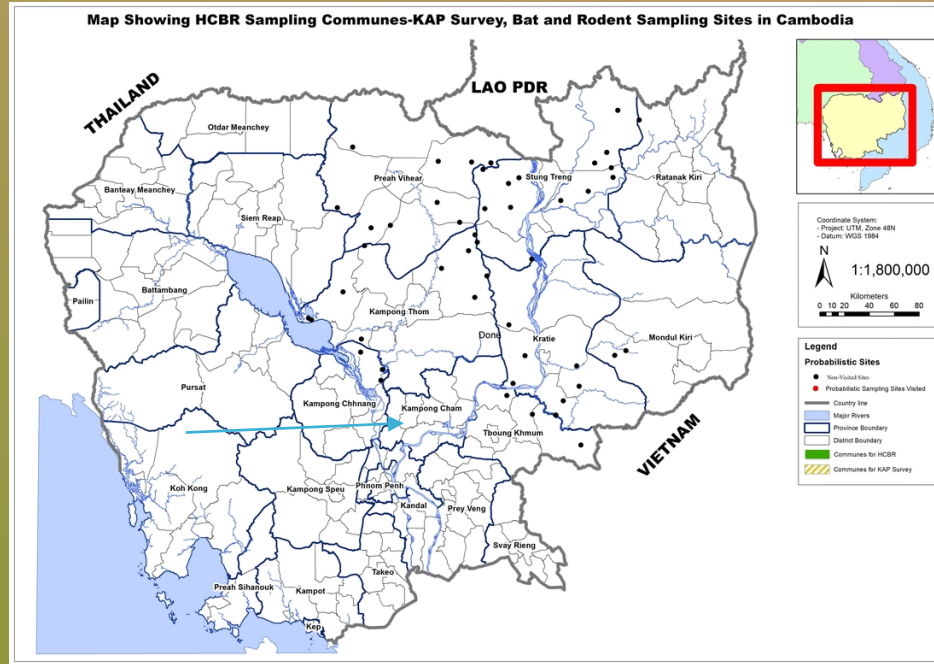

Challenges faced

- Lack of Resources and Laboratory Capability for Active and Passive Wildlife Diseases Surveillance and Monitoring
- How have you overcome this challenge: Keep working and consulting with relevance institutions related importance of wildlife disease surveillance and monitoring can contribute to security of One Health especially the Human Health.
- OIE can assist us for overcoming this challenge through Resource Mobilization and Capacity Building for enable routine Active and Passive Wildlife Diseases Surveillance and Monitoring

Ongoing Wildlife Diseases Surveillance and Monitoring Activities in Cambodia



Field Sample Collection (2016-2020): 267 sites in 24 provinces (plus Phnom Penh), included 222 sites of probabilistic sampling, 60 visits of 21 opportunistic sampling sites, 60 communes for Knowledge Attitude and Practice (KAP) Assessment and Human sera Sample collection have been visited, and sampling of small mammals and bats.
