National Coordinators Meeting (29 to 30 July 2021)

- Aligning National FMD Prevention and Control Plan with the SEACFMD Roadmap 2021-2025;
 - Ongoing
- to finalize Regional SEACFMD Roadmap Implementation Plan
 - Regional plan developed and endorsed during the 26th Sub-Com Meeting
- to finalize the M&E framework for the SEACFMD Roadmap 2021-2025 and use this for reporting the progress
 - M&E framework finalized with indicators for Outputs, Outcomes, Objective and Goal and proposed for endorsement/ Baseline obtained

Progress on implementation of Sub-Commission and other SEACFMD Governance meeting Recommendations

26th SEACFMD Sub-Commission Meeting (16 to 18 March 2022)

- Support evaluation of SEACFMD Campaign from 1997 to 2020
 - Received support from Members and Partners
- to conduct capacity building for human and technical resources such as advance epidemiology and data analysis, use on PCR for routine diagnosis, etc;
 - Ongoing
- Enhance communication by digitization of FMD communication materials and development of SEACFMD Portal and dashboard.
 - Communication materials digitized
 - SEACFMD Portal will be launched on 5 October 2022



Progress on implementation of Sub-Commission and other SEACFMD Governance meeting Recommendations

26th SEACFMD Sub-Commission Meeting (16 to 18 March 2022)

- To work on procedures to validate and declare freedom from Asia 1 serotype from the SEACFMD region.
 - Ongoing
- to strengthen epidemiological investigation and management of FMD outbreaks with collection of samples and laboratory diagnosis including virus characterization and ensure closure of outbreak
 - Brainstorming session on day 3 – 5 October 2022
- use modelling for identifying priority areas for vaccination; and CONDUCT anthropological studies on perceptions and behaviour of farmers on vaccination to enhance FMD vaccination.

Progress on implementation of Sub-Commission and other SEACFMD Governance meeting Recommendations

Special Meeting of the SEACFMD National Coordinators focused on FMD Preparedness and Response (12 June 2022)

Number of recommendations to enhance FMD preparedness and Response

- FMD preparedness - Review Legislative framework, Contingency Plan, Surveillance System, HR Capacity, Laboratory diagnostic capacity, Financing etc.
- Enhance early warning – risk assessment, targeted surveillance, epidemiological intelligence etc.
- Rapid detection – refresher course for animal health staff, awareness to animal owners, surveillance, develop laboratory diagnostic capacity.
- Enhance Rapid response – review and test contingency plan, improve Incident Command System, develop emergency vaccination plan.
 - WOAHSRRSEA shared relevant resources to the Indonesia and other MCs at the risk of FMD incursion.
 - FMD free countries are undertaking number of activities to enhance their FMD preparedness and
