



# African horse sickness (AHS) in the Asia-Pacific region

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Kick-off meeting of the WOAH project to facilitate international horse movement in Asia and the Pacific region 18 January 2023 at 16.00 (Tokyo time)

### Background

- African horse sickness: a vector-borne disease affecting equids
- Endemic in large parts of Africa, with some incursion in the past in South Europe, Middle East, South Asia
- One of the diseases for which the WOAH has a procedure for official recognition of countries sanitary status
- Asia Pacific region: Several countries officially recognised as historically free from AHS by the WOAH





### Worldwide distribution of AHS

- AHS is the only horse-related disease with official status recognition by the WOAH
- AHS was absent in Asia-Pacific for more than 50 years (1963 Pakistan, 1959 India)

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### AHS in Thailand

- The first outbreak started in February- March 2020 with total of 17 outbreaks.
- Horses: 610 cases and 568 deaths and Chapman's zebras (zoo): 2 cases and 2 deaths
- Serotype 1 detected. Sequencing results samples related to virus field strains originating from the Republic of South Africa and Namibia.
- Zebras imported into Thailand from South Africa in July 2019, January 2020, and March 2020.





### AHS in Thailand

- Control mesures implemented:
  - movement control inside the country
  - zoning
  - surveillance within and outside containment and/or protection zone
  - control of vectors and vector surveillance
  - Vaccination in response to the outbreaks: more than 10,000 equids vaccinated
- Public private partnership (PPP) established
  - MoU signed between DLD and horse industry and 17 agencies, including the Department of National Parks, Wildlife and Plant Conservation





### AHS in Malaysia

- 1 outbreak detected in August 2020 by RT-PCR test at the national lab (Veterinary Research Institute, Ipoh)
- 5 horses affected in 1 farm that were killed and disposed of.
- The WOAH Ref Lab. confirmed AHS serotype 9.





### AHS in Malaysia

- Control mesures implemented:
  - movement control inside the country
  - zoning
  - surveillance within and outside containment and/or protection zone
  - control of vectors and vector surveillance
  - stamping out of positives and contacts
  - vaccination remains prohibited
  - Epidemiological investigation to determine the source of infection were not conclusive.





### AHS status in the Asia and Pacific region

- China, Singapore, India, New Caledonia, Philippines, Australia and New Zealand are recognised by WOAH as AHS free countries
- AHS free status suspended:
  - Myanmar status withdrawn since November 2021.
  - Thailand suspended from 27 March 2020 due to AHS outbreaks
  - Malaysia suspended from 6 August 2020 due to an outbreak
  - Thailand and Malaysia were previously recognised as historically AHS free countries





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### Maintenance of AHS free status

- All countries officially recognised with AHS-free status should provide their annual reconfirmations for maintenance of free status
- Specific surveillance requirements for maintenance of status are required for countries neighbouring a country with undertermined free status (infected)

# Highlights of activities in response to AHS Outbreaks

African horse sickness

(AHS) is a viral disease

of horses, donkeys,

mules and zebras.

It can kill up to 95%

of affected equids.

The disease is spread by tiny flying insects: midges, also called Culicoides



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African horse sickness (AHS) controlling the vector to stop the spread

AHS is a deadly disease of equids (horses, donkeys, mules, zebras). It is transmitted through midges which act as **vectors**.
