



### Link between WOAH and WTO SPS agreement



#### **Volume II: Disease-specific chapters**

- Safe commodities where appropriate
  - Safe commodities = based on absence of the pathogenic agent in the traded commodity OR inactivation by processing or treatment that the commodity has undergone
  - Importing countries should not apply trade restrictions to safe commodities with respect to the pathogenic agent concerned
- Determination of the animal health status of a country, zone or compartment
  - Official status recognition
  - Self declaration of animal health status

- Recommendations on safe trade for live animals, genetic material, other products of animal origin (meat, milk, eggs, skins, etc.)
- Specific management of commodities, e.g.
  - Recommendations on inactivation
  - Vector-protection during transport
- Recommendations on surveillance
  - Surveillance strategies specific to infection/ infestation
  - Link to Chapter 1.4 and 1.5 on animal health and vector surveillance

# Chapter 4.4 Zoning and compartmentalisation

- Principles for defining and establishing a zone /compartment
- ✓ Definition –free, infected, protected, containment zones
- ✓ Bilateral recognition of country or zone status by trading countries





# Key concept

# Animal health status

means the status of a **country**, **zone** or **compartment** with respect to an animal disease in accordance with the criteria listed in the relevant disease-specific chapter or Chapter 1.4. of the *Terrestrial Code*.











#### **Definition**

#### **BIOSECURITY**

a set of management and physical measures designed to reduce the <u>risk</u> of introduction, establishment and spread of animal diseases, <u>infections</u> or <u>infestations</u> to, from and within an animal population.

#### BIOSECURITY PLAN

a plan that identifies potential pathways for the introduction and spread of disease in a <u>zone</u> or <u>compartment</u>, and describes the measures which are being or will be applied to mitigate the disease <u>risks</u>, if applicable, in accordance with the recommendations in the <u>Terrestrial Code</u>.

#### **ZONE**

a part of a country defined by the <u>Veterinary Authority</u>, containing an animal <u>population</u> or <u>subpopulation</u> with a specific <u>animal health status</u> with respect to an <u>infection</u> or <u>infestation</u> for the purposes of <u>international trade</u> or disease prevention or control.

#### **COMPARTMENT**

an animal <u>subpopulation</u> contained in one or more <u>establishments</u>, separated from other susceptible <u>populations</u> by a common biosecurity management system, and with a specific <u>animal</u> <u>health status</u> ......

#### SUB-POPULATION

means a distinct part of a <u>population</u> identifiable in accordance with specific common animal health characteristics.



# **Zoning and Compartmentalisation application**

- Assist Member Countries wishing to establish and maintain different subpopulations within their territory
- Applied in accordance with the measures in the relevant disease chapter(s)
- To regain free status following a disease outbreak, follow the recommendations in the relevant disease chapter
- Outlines a process through which trading partners may recognize such subpopulations, best implemented by gaining agreement prior to outbreaks







## **WTO SPS Agreement Regionalisation principle**

Members shall recognise the concept of disease-free areas, whether all of a country, part of a country, or all or parts of several countries (Article 6)

Members shall ensure sanitary measures take into account (Article 6):

- Disease prevalence
- The existence of eradication or control programmes
- The criteria or guidelines developed by the relevant international organizations



## Implementation of the Regionalisation principle in international trade

#### **Exporting country**

- Implement disease prevention and control
- Surveillance and demonstration of freedom
- Setting up regionalisation programmes



#### **Importing country**

- Assessing exporting country programmes
- Defining import requirements



Compartmentalisation




