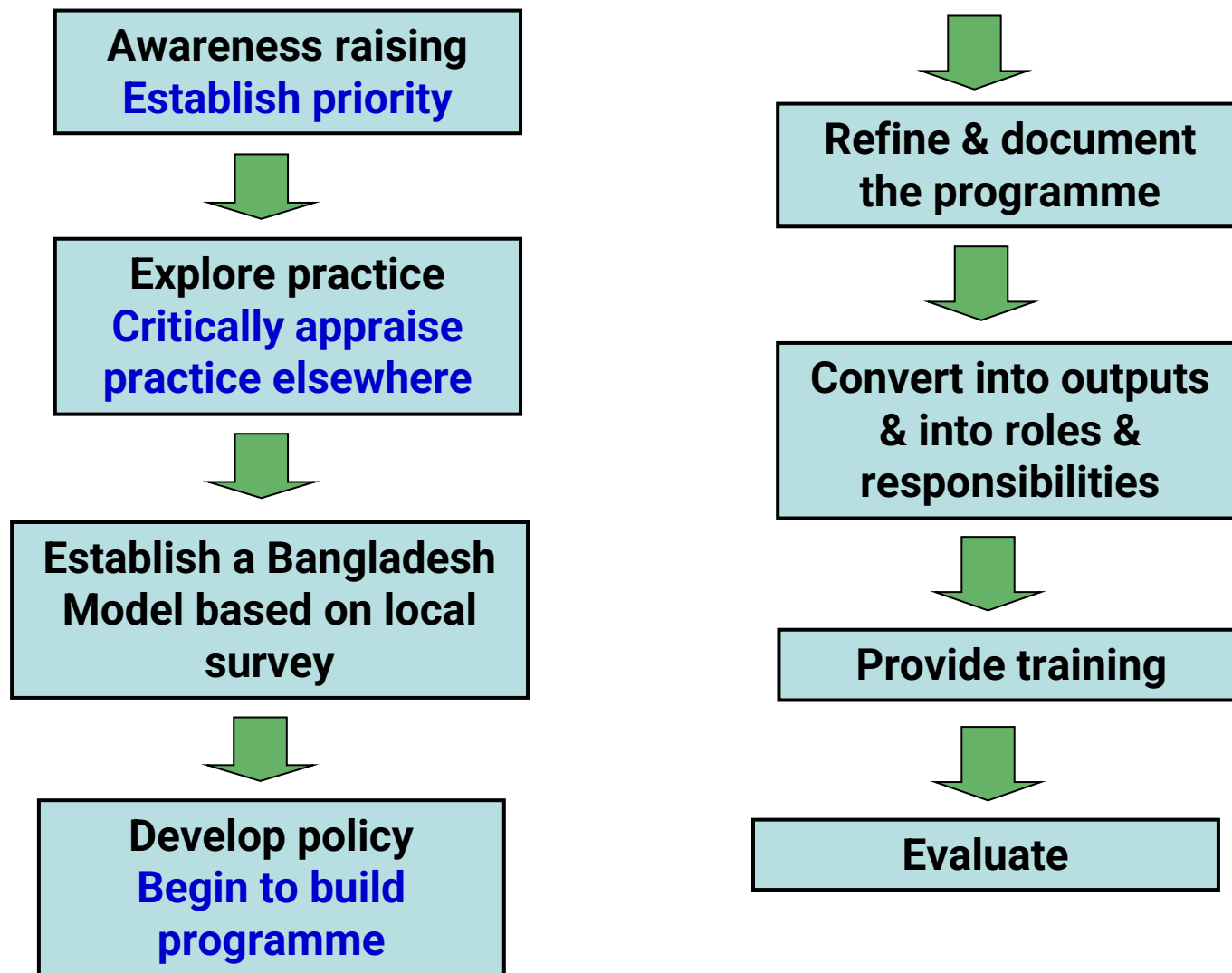

- An organic development towards a South Asia Veterinary Education (**SAVE**) Network

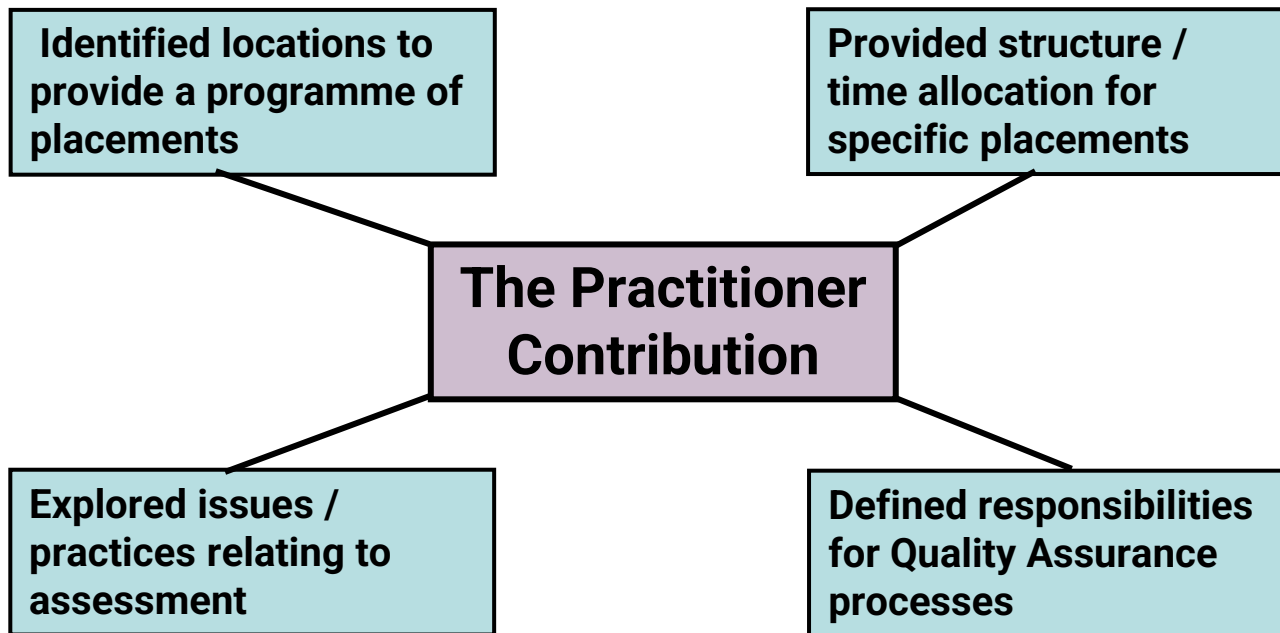
# 3-Year Programme of Internship Development





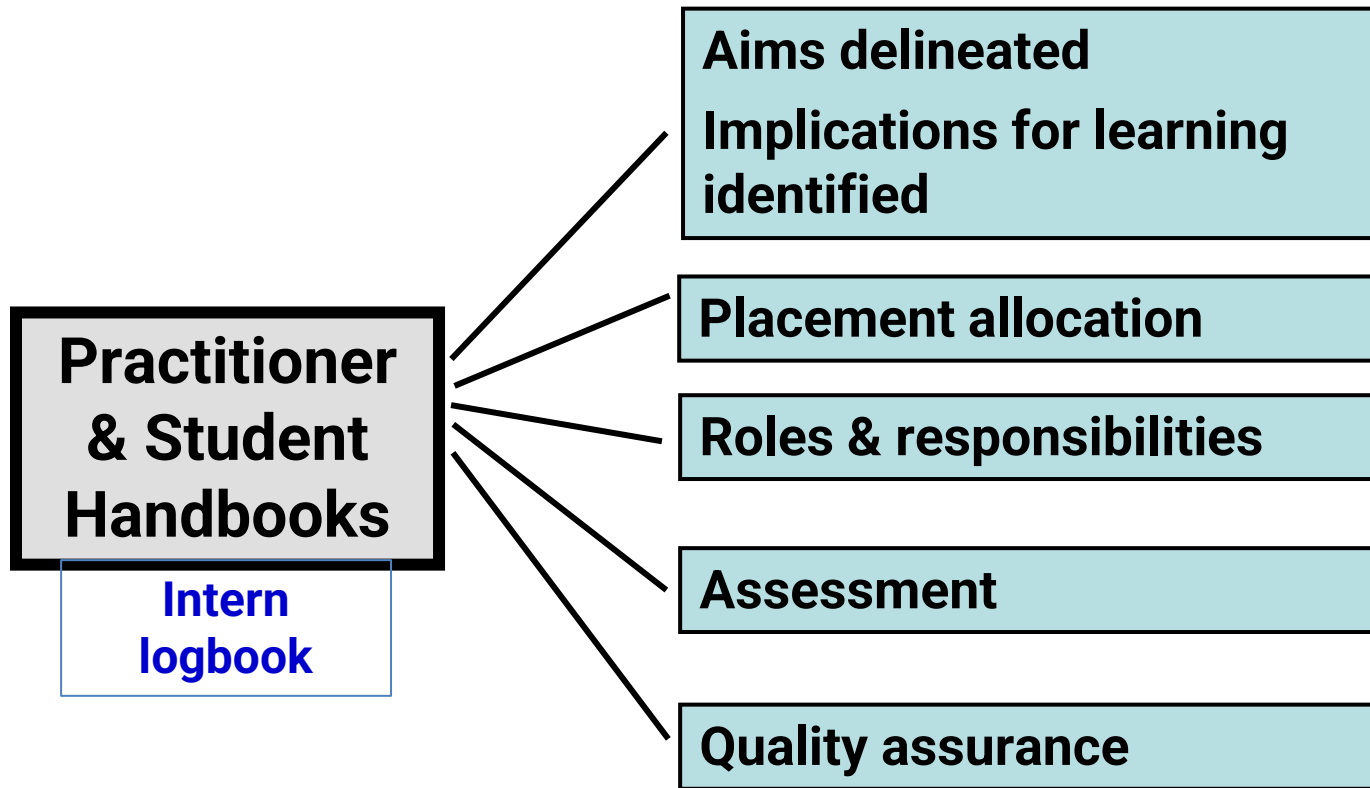

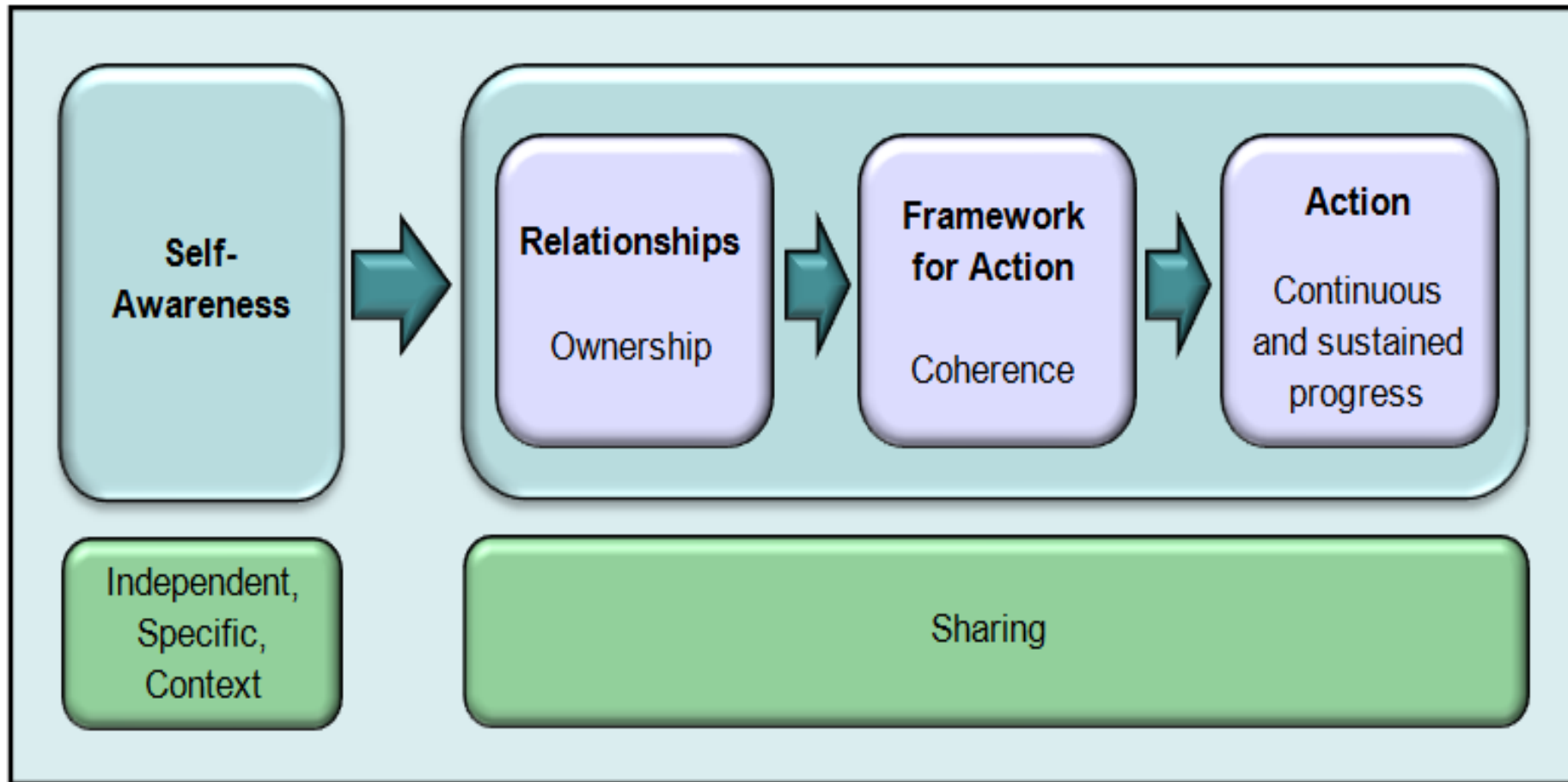

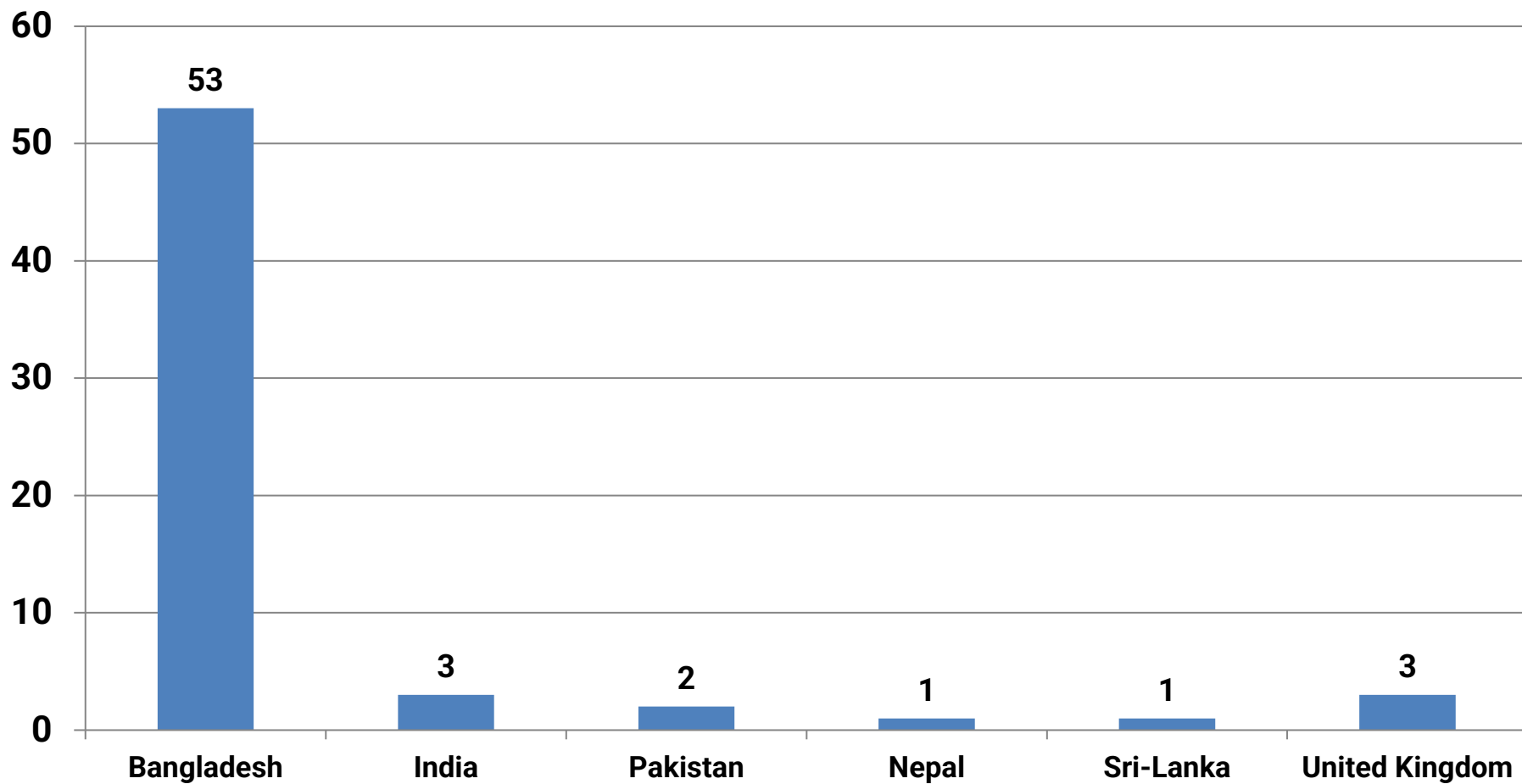
- 'A rallying point' – the quality of South Asian Veterinarian?

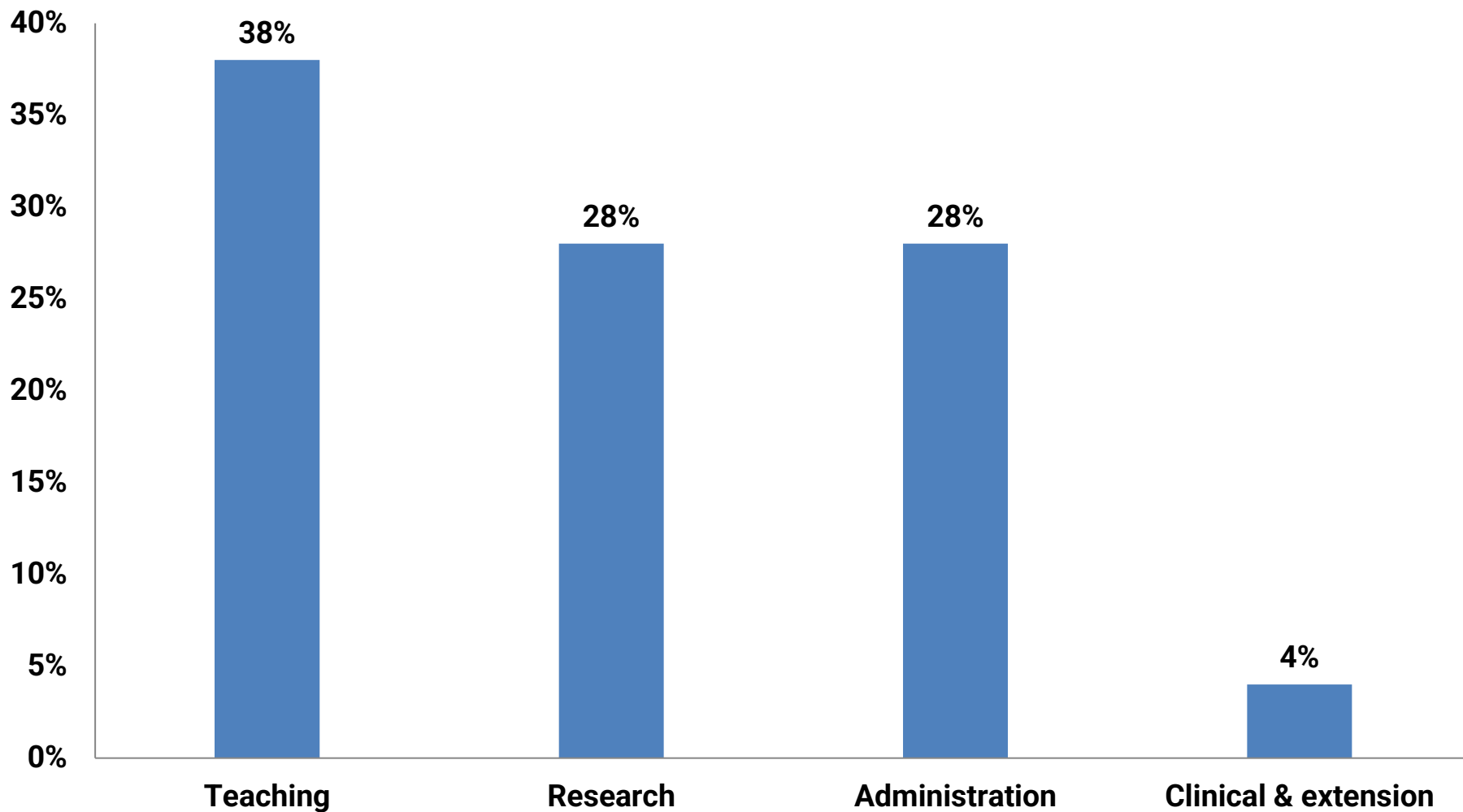
# Concept of Vet Education Network

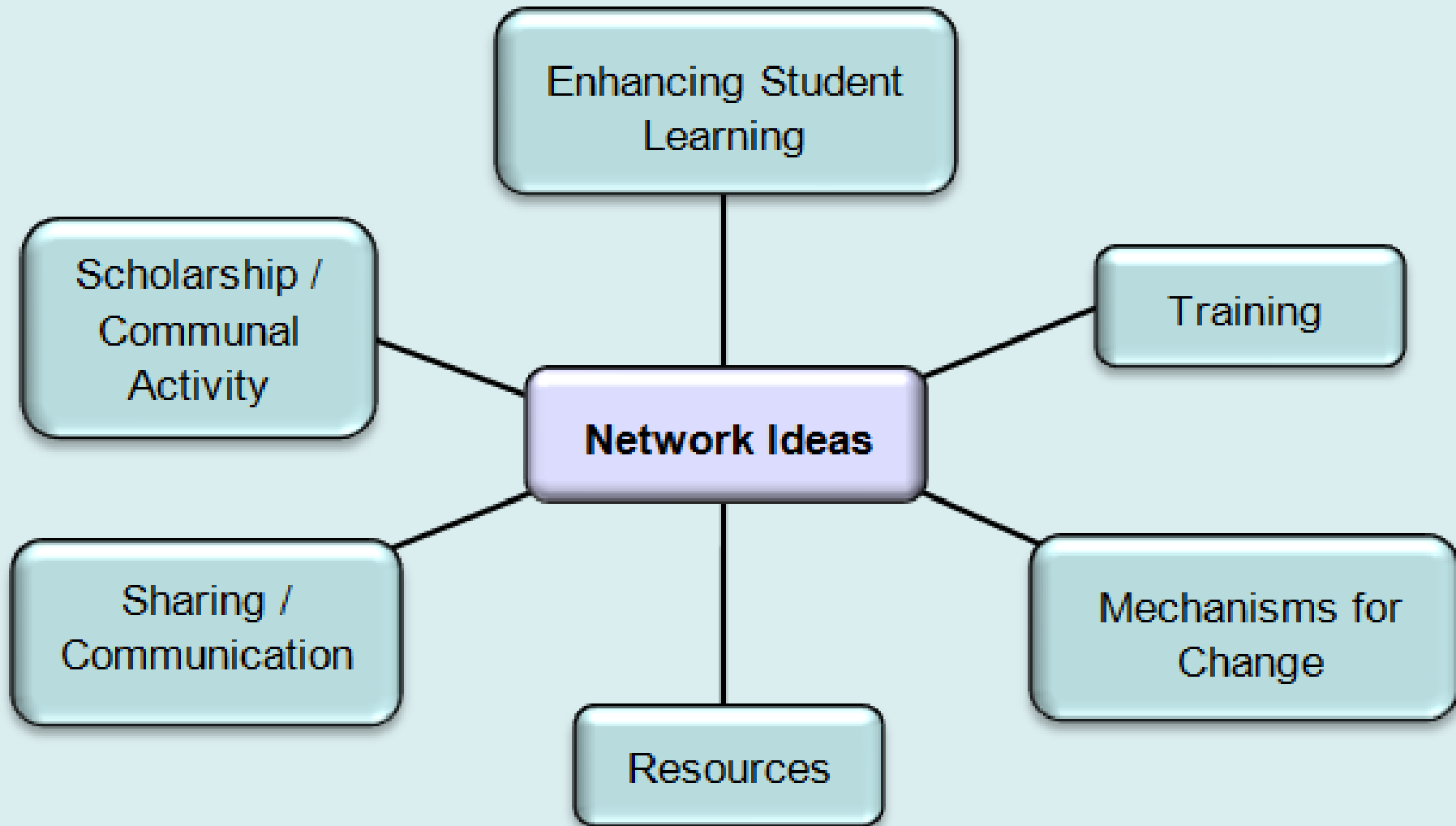

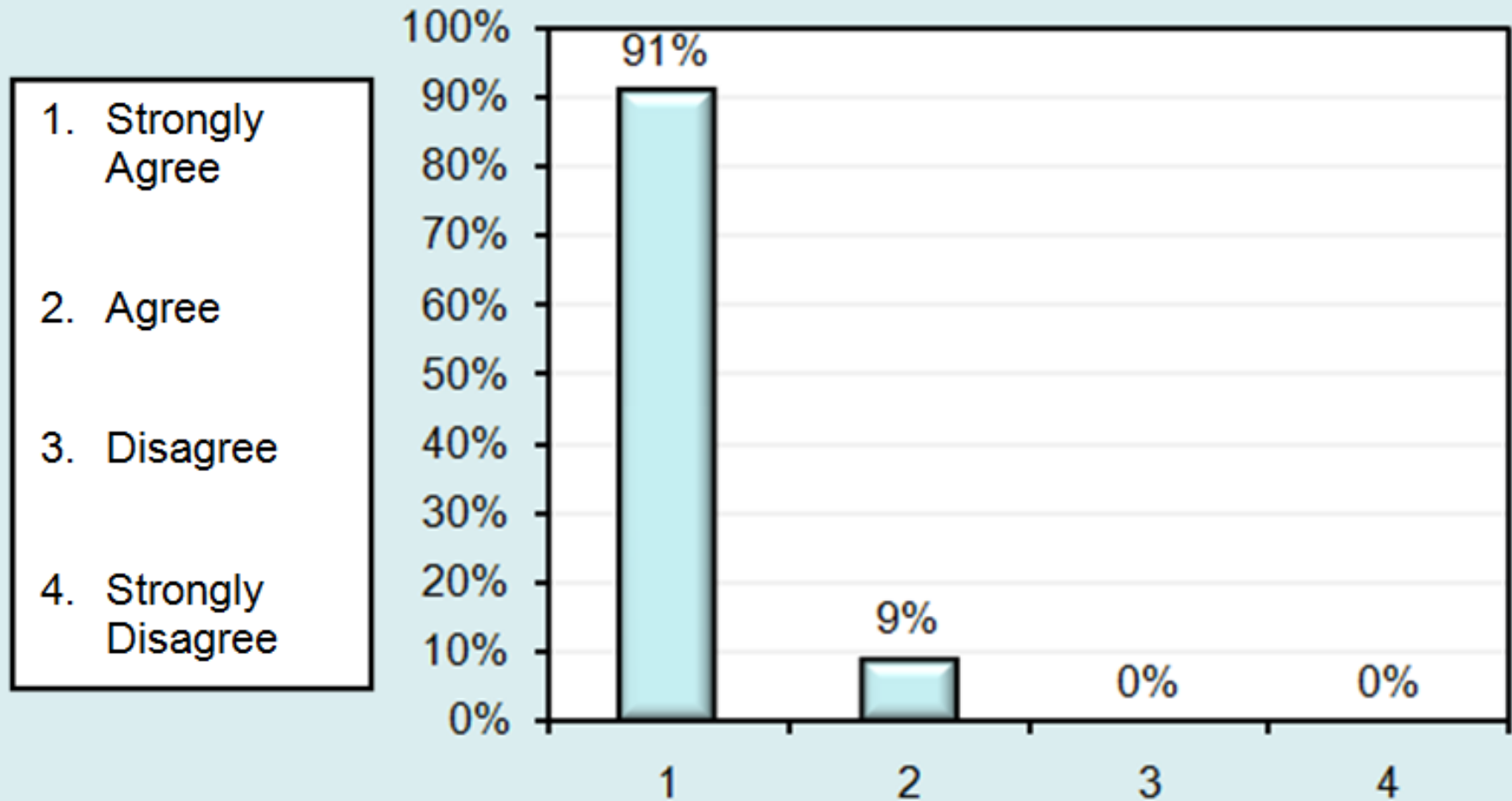
- the need to establish a consensus as to **what the network was for** – incorporated into a Memorandum of Understanding

I believe that there is a strong need for inter-institutional educational networks in South Asia?

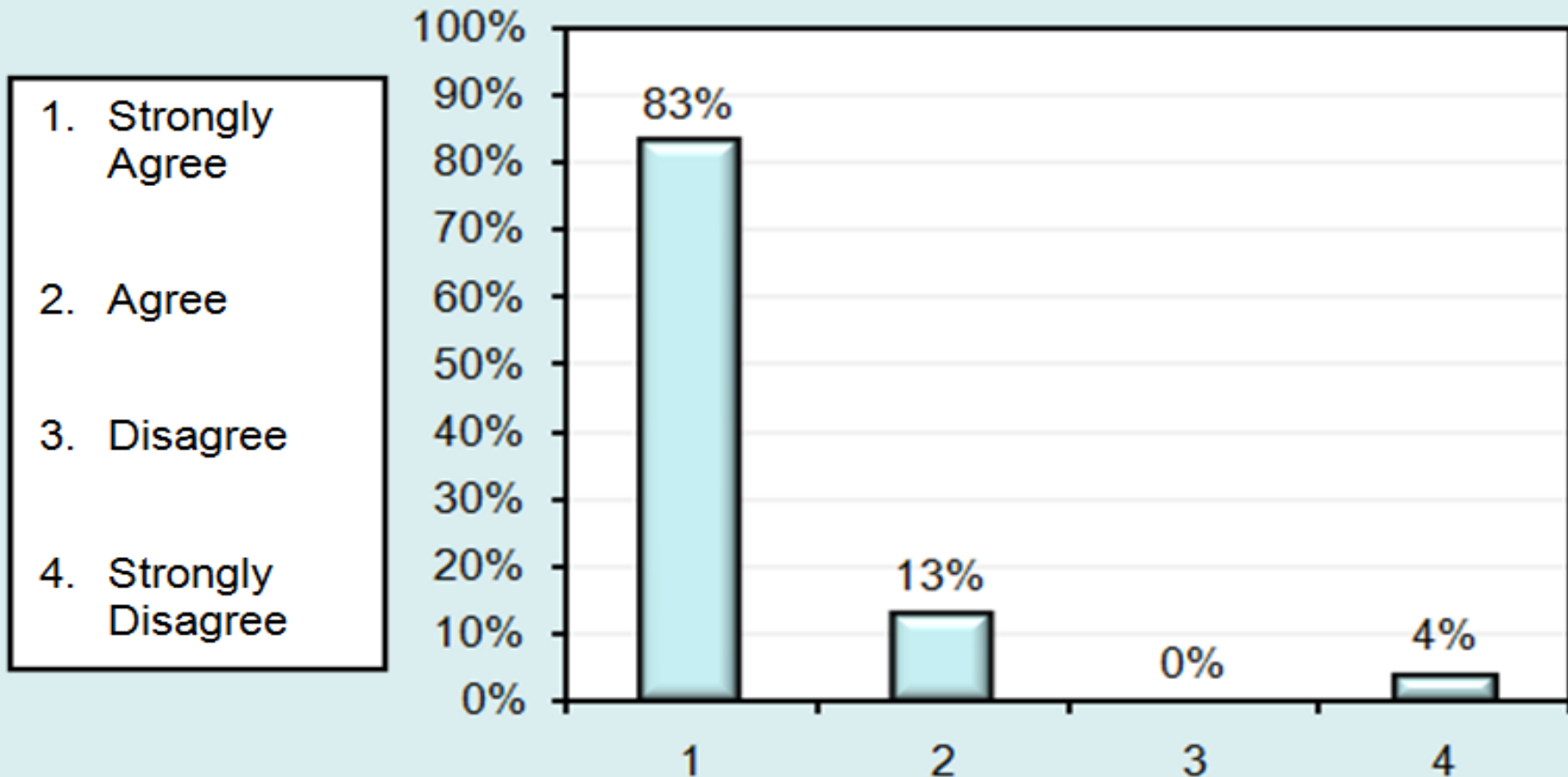

I am keen to participate in an inter-institutional educational network in South Asia?

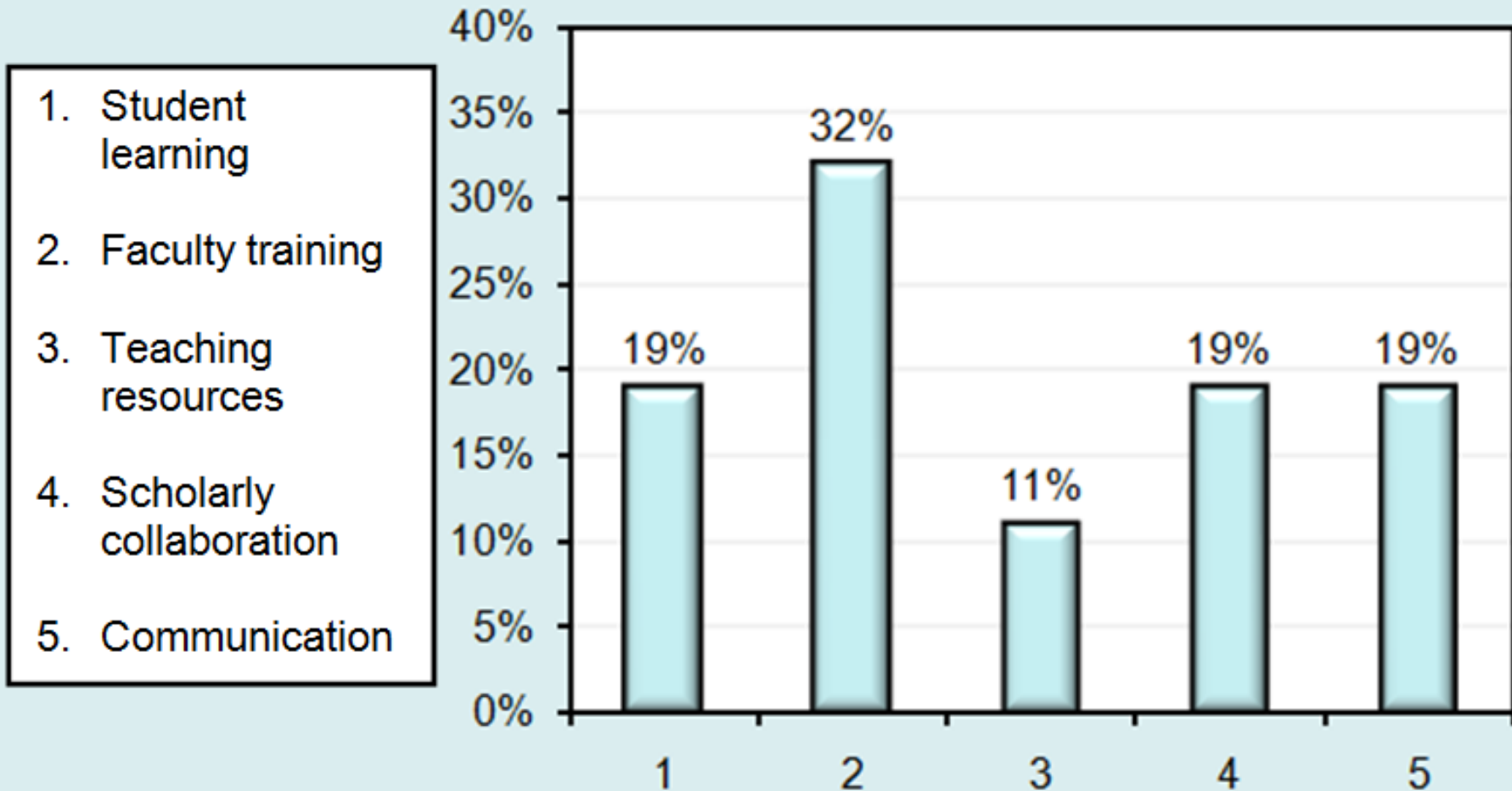

# The Way Forward



**There was unanimous & enthusiastic agreement that a veterinary educational network be set up for South Asia**

## **“The South Asia Veterinary Education Network – SAVE-Network”**

- All the Deans of attending institutions were to be incorporated into an overarching **Steering & Advisory Committee**
- Responsibility for organising the Network for the first three months would fall on the **Vice-Chancellor of CVASU, Professor Nitish Debnath**
- It was agreed also that a first draft of a **MoU** be compiled & circulated to each partner for consideration, & possible amendment

# The Way Forward (Cont.)



## Once established, networks need a good start

- The leaders of each partner institution are crucial to success, but no matter how enthusiastic & capable they are, they cannot do it on their own
- The existence of the Network must be explained across the Faculty / University, so that all staff appreciate they are members of this South Asia team
- Someone other than the Vice-Principal / Dean must be given a steering role – **“every captain needs good lieutenants”**
- The partners must start doing something
  - **What aspects of practice / resources / etc are excellent at my institution & could be shared more widely with partners?**
  - **What are the challenges – areas where help from others would be appreciated?**



# The Way Forward (Cont.)

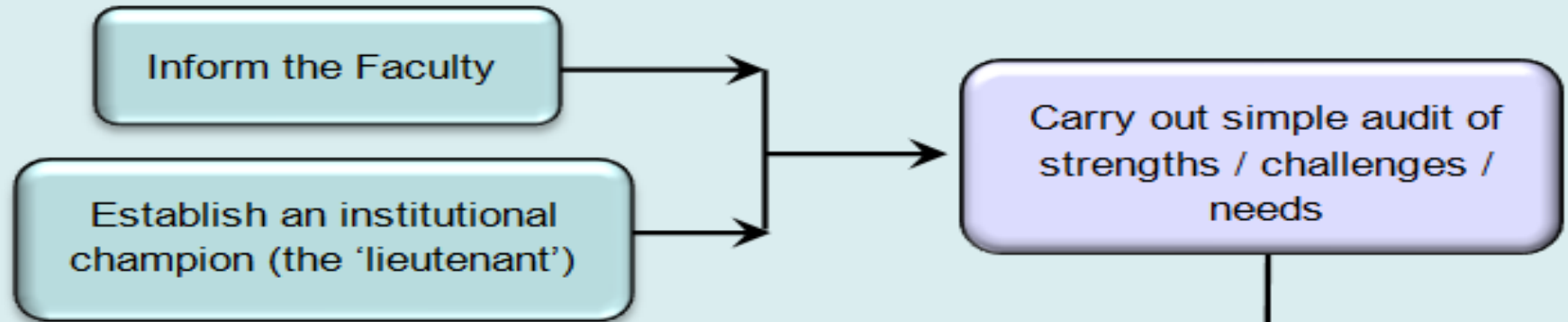


- The Network needs a facilitator to keep things ticking over – someone energetic & above all neutral
- Money! Funding agencies believe that the establishment of a network is the **end of the story**
- Finally, the Network **needs an early success story to celebrate** to the rest of the world

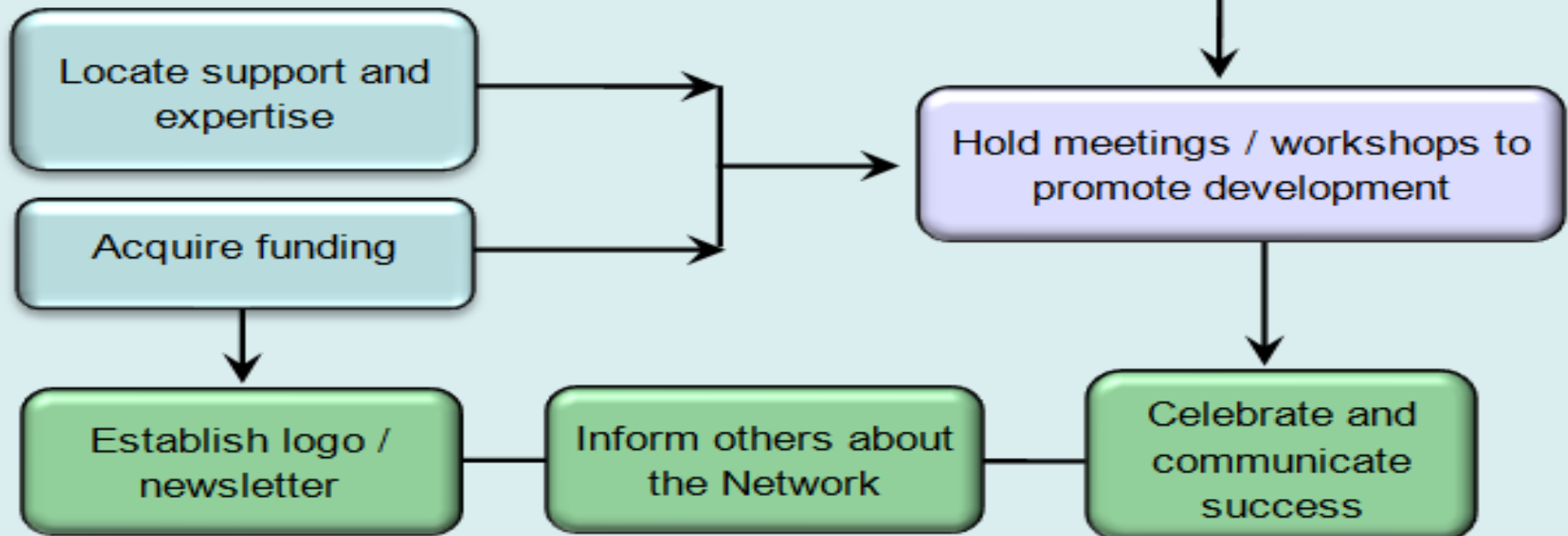


