


What is an incident management system (IMS)?

An IMS is the set of policies, procedures and resources (including personnel) to respond to incidents. It helps organise communication, control, and decision-making during an incident.

Why do we need an IMS?

WOAH needs an IMS to respond to incidents caused by a range of hazards. It will improve international coordination, clarify roles and responsibilities, and foster an emergency management culture. Past events such as the <u>COVID-19 pandemic</u>, ASF, and avian influenza exposed gaps in our preparedness.

Countering misinformation and disinformation




- We also recently published this manual for countering disinformation and misinformation during animal health emergencies
