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If an emergency animal disease is suspected or confirmed in Australia, DAFF will activate the AUSBIOAGPLAN.

The Australian Veterinary Emergency Plan (AUSVETPLAN) describes the nationally-agreed response approach—including immediate actions to be taken.

AUSVETPLAN describes
Australia's proposed approach to
managing an emergency animal
disease incursion.

- Managed by Animal Health
 Australia
- Comprises a series of manuals and supporting documents
- Contains a response strategy for each of the diseases listed in the EADRA
- Developed collaboratively by governments and industries
- Undergoes continuous improvement

Emergency Animal Disease Response Agreement (EADRA) covers the management and funding of a response for animal disease incidents.

- Legally binding arrangement
- Unique and innovative framework managed by Animal Health Australia
- 66 animal diseases across 4 categories
- 23 signatories including Animal Health Australia, governments and key industry bodies

Critical Incident Response Plan (CIRP) sets out DAFF's arrangements for managing an incident.

- Describes the Incident
 Management Team structure
- Job cards describe each role of the Incident Management Team
- Procedures explain how to undertake specific functions
- Contains checklists, forms and templates
- Currently under review to ensure the plan is modern and relevant
