
- Australia is free of foot-and-mouth disease (FMD)
- In 2023-24 we:
 - continued to strengthen biosecurity requirements for imported goods and mail at the border
 - maintained our upskilled detector dog fleet and continued deploying detector dogs at more international airports
 - increased animal surveillance activities in northern Australia
 - increased Australia's early detection and response capacity through encouraging veterinarians and animal health personnel to undertake emergency animal disease outbreak training
 - supported control of FMD in our region by:
 - assisting Timor-Leste and Papua New Guinea to increase preparedness and response capacity
 - funding the CSIRO Australian Centre for Disease Preparedness to assist implementation of laboratory quality control and proficiency testing programs in Indonesia







- Australia has detailed, well-rehearsed response plans and arrangements in place. Governments and industry's preparedness is continuously reviewed and tested through simulation exercises.
- Australia's Emergency Animal Disease Response Agreement (EADRA)
 documents set out the nationally agreed arrangements for the cost
 sharing of disease responses, including compensation for affected
 livestock enterprises.
- The Australian Veterinary Emergency Plan (AUSVETPLAN) contains the nationally-agreed approach for the response to emergency animal disease incidents in Australia.
- The AUSVETPLAN Disease Response Strategy for FMD details the government and industry's agreed approach to be taken if FMD occurred in Australia, including an assessment of the role of vaccination








Sustainable funding

- Solution: the 2023-24 Budget permanently increased biosecurity funding and invests an extra \$AUD1 billion over the next four years in our essential biosecurity services, with over \$AUD260 million in new funding per year, ongoing from 2027-28
- Veterinary workforce shortages
 - Solution: Australia is collaborating with key stakeholders including veterinary professionals, academic institutions, industry stakeholders, and policymakers to work towards a unified solution





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
