



The Prevalence of Rabies in Brunei Darussalam

In 2014, inline with ARES, MOH and MPRT jointly developed the Rabies Surveillance Plan for Brunei

In 2016, the Dog Bite registry was created. All Health facilities are requested to report human cases of dog bites to MOH. Cases will be monitored for any symptoms that may develop within 14 days of being bitten

Key achievements of Ministry of Health Brunei Darussalam



Rabies vaccination for pre-exposure prophylaxis to highrisk groups for eg: MPRT colleagues (lab and vets), dog handlers from NGOs, animal shelters etc. Post exposure prophylaxis vaccination to dog bites individuals who present to health centres/hospitals

Rabies situation (Year 2023-present) – Animal Health

- Rabies situation in animals NIL
- Rabies cases in humans
- Highlights of rabies burden NIL

Brunei Darussalam maintains free from rabies cases in both animals and humans

- Present key rabies prevention and control strategies including the achievements
- 1) Policies & legislation Animal (Disease and Quarantine) Act, 2021 / Brunei Law, Dog Act
- 2) In 2014, inline with ARES, MOH and MPRT jointly developed the Rabies Surveillance Plan for Brunei. National Joint Task Force (JTF) for Zoonotic Diseases was formed since 2018 as a component under the International Health Regulations as collaboration between the human and animal health sector. Taskforce consists of multi-agencies (Ministry of Home Affairs, Ministry of Health and Ministry of Primary Resources and Tourism as co chairs). The most recent meeting was held on September 11, 2024
- 3) Table-Top simulations specific for Rabies (multi agencies involvement) based on senarios, identify gaps), collaborative efforts with MOHA (national dog shelter) sharing of expertise,





Rabies Vaccination Drive-Through for both cats and dogs since December 2022, done throughout the 4 districts.
