

Membership requirements and application process

According to AAVS Bylaws ...

- Members of the Association are the educational institutions
 (universities, faculties, colleges, departments, etc.) of veterinary
 medicine in Asian countries, recognized or accredited by the relevant
 national authority in their country.
- An application to become a member of the Association must be submitted by the Head of the Veterinary Institution, endorsed by at least two (2) Member Institutions and approved by the Executive Committee.
- The Regular Member is to pay an annual membership fee of US\$ 100
 (via PayPal or bank transfer)

Membership application steps

Interested institution - obtain internal approval

Head of institution prepare letter to
AAVS & request two
other AAVS
Members for
endorsement letters

Head of institution - submit the documents to AAVS

AAVS Executive
Committee - review
the application
(about 1 month)

Once approved, become AAVS Member upon payment of membership fee
