







SEACFMD Roadmap (2016-2020)






Decrease FMD incidence in South East Asia and China by the year 2020, expand and maintain FMD freedom in countries and zones that have achieved that status;








Multiple strains co-circulating in the region




Temporal distribution of FMDV















Incursion of exotic FMDV strains



Incursion of O/Ind-2001d in SEA in 2015








Risk analysis on incursion of exotic FMD viruses into Southeast Asia







The risk of further incursions of exotic FMDVs into SEA is not a matter of "if" but rather of "when"!



Very high risk of FMD spread into the proposed border control zones




Regional Animal Movement Study, 2015






Cattle price differentials across the region








Increasing demands/price in China

Ruili-Muse Movement Pathway (Cattle/buffalo)

- Major sources: Central Myanmar
- Illegal movements
- 6,000-18,000 cattle and buffalo moved per month
- Complicated journey (truck + walk);
- Cost 460 USD/head via illegal channels
- Cattle/buffaloes from South Asia pass
 Myanmar via Myawaddy or Shweli of Kachin (require further information/validation)







Mekong River Movement Pathway (Cattle/buffalo)


- 30,000 365,000 cattle/buffalo moved annually
- 200 cattle/buffaloes per boat
- Not checked by Lao authorities and no importation fee charged
- Significantly cheaper than the road route: 3 USD/head







Joint Statement on Harmonizing Procedures for Livestock Movement among Cambodia, China, Laos, Malaysia, Myanmar, Thailand and Vietnam



WE JOINTLY AGREE THAT:

- Veterinary Services of Member Countries shall develop, strengthen and improve procedures for managing the movement of livestock and their products in each country, in order to control transboundary animal diseases, promote food safety, and protect the health of animals and the public in our countries and our region.
- Procedures for managing biosecurity and the health risks associated with the movement of livestock and their products, including international health certification, will be developed and harmonized based on the OIE Code and other international standards.
- Bi-lateral or multi-lateral agreements on regional livestock movement and trade should be developed and implemented.
- 4. The Upper Mekong Working Group, coordinated by OIE Sub Regional Representation for South-East Asia, should serve as the focus for development of standardised protocols and procedures to support cross-border trade in livestock, including consideration of the development of control zones. The representatives of individual Member Countries on this group will be suitably supported by our respective Veterinary Services to assist in this important coordination work.








Proposed Trade Zones

Private sector driven FMD control campaign



- Modernization of the trading arrangements may improve biosecurity measures required by trading partners, which might improve biosecurity along the value chain
- Willingness to vaccinate at their own cost
- Big traders and in partnership with government regulators may require smallholder suppliers to vaccinate their animals



Role of the private sector



- Strong partnership with government to control FMD
- Public awareness campaign
 - Bring the message down to its own network
- Early detection and reporting of diseases
- Facilitate safe trade of livestock and livestock products



Benefits of FMD control/eradication to farmers and private sector

- Economic losses due to FMD is reduced
 - Less cost of inputs for livestock production (medicines and disinfectants in case of outbreaks)
- Better price of the animals
- Better access to market, particularly exports
- Less cost of trading animals
 - Quarantine period will be reduced
 - Less strict inspection









Role of the PSCC



- To advise the Sub-Commission on ways to facilitate developments in the livestock sector that support disease control and optimise production, and to integrate the private sector into national and regional animal health systems.
- To assist in the development of the regional plan for enhancing private sector involvement in FMD control in Southeast Asia
- To provide an avenue for two way communication and information exchange between the Sub-Commission and private sector organisations in member countries



Duties and responsibilities of the Consultative Committee and its members



- To provide strategic advice to the Sub-Commission on private sector involvement in FMD control in SEACFMD countries
- To advise on the development and implementation of the plan for enhanced private sector involvement in FMD control in SEACFMD Countries
- Provide policy and strategic advice to the Sub-Commission during and between meetings of the Sub-Commission
- Advise on the development of the programme for the private sector component of meetings of the Sub-Commission
