Global control of African swine fever: a GF-TADs initiative developed jointly by WOAH and FAO launched in 2020

- Build in experiences with other global strategies/programmes for transboundary disease control
- Consider the realities of the regions
- Create a framework to ensure synergies and good coordination
- Define the objectives, outputs, outcomes and indicators
- A 6-year (2020–2025) strategic plan linked to a 2-year operational plan

Global Initiative

- **Objective 1.** Improve the capability of countries to control (prevent, respond, eradicate) ASF using WOAH standards and best practices that are based on the latest science.
- **Objective 2.** Establish an effective **coordination** and cooperation framework for the global control of ASE.
- **Objective 3.** Facilitate **business continuity**.

Standing Group of Experts

- Four regional SGEs established: Africa (2022), Americas (2019), Asia-Pacific (2019), Europe (2014)
- Technical forum that brings together decision makers and experts to coordinate regional efforts and address ASF control in collaborative and harmonised manner across the region
- Promote regular exchange of information and best practices in ASF management
- Instrumental in supporting the Global Initiative

Global Coordination Committee for ASF (planned for May 2023)

Strengthen inter-regional cooperation and dialogue on ASF prevention and control

- Inform strategic priorities common across the 4 regions
- Review progress of Global Initiative
- Provide recommendations to the ASF WG



Focus areas of the ASF Working Group (2022 - 2023)

Outcome 1: Capability of countries to control ASF is improved

Outcome 1.1. Improve understanding by countries of strengths and weaknesses of national Veterinary Services to control ASF

Assess needs of Veterinary Services

Outcome 1.2. Improved capacity to conduct risk assessment

- Understand epidemiological role of wild pigs
- Build capacity on RA, value-chain analysis, social sciences

Outcome 1.3. Improved capacity to conduct risk management

- Enhance lab capacity
- Explore alternatives to mass culling
- Promote PPP

Outcome 1.4. Improved capacity to conduct risk communication

Increase public awareness





Focus areas of the ASF Working Group (2022 - 2023)

Outcome 2: Regional and global coordination and cooperation is improved

Outcome 2.1. Disease information is submitted in a transparent and timely manner, is accurate, up to date and readily accessible

- Monitor occurrence of ASFV strains (vaccine-like)
- Promote sharing of information (virus sequence, notification)

Outcome 2.2. Effective regional/global expert networks strengthen intersectoral coordination and cooperation

• Support regional and inter-regional cooperation

Outcome 2.3. Facilitate the recognition by development agencies and technical partners of the value of ASF control and their active participation

• Promote PPP

Outcome 2.4. ASF global research is active and coordinated to address scientific needs

Coordinate research efforts (vaccine development)



Focus areas of the ASF Working Group (2022 - 2023)

Outcome 3: National, regional and international trade of pigs and their products, based on international standards and guidelines, is facilitated

Outcome 3.1. International standards for safe trade are well-understood, accepted and promoted

Outcome 3.2. International standards are implemented effectively



Monitoring and evaluation framework for the ASF GI

Monitoring and Evaluation of the Global Initiative

- Developed logical framework for the Global Initiative, with outcome and output indicators
 - Most data to be derived from FAO and WOAH staff on activities conducted, guidelines developed etc...
- Outcome indicators (1 & 3) to be based on self-evaluation by countries on capacity of Veterinary Services specific to ASF
- 9 questions altogether concerning different scopes of activity
- Helps inform strategic priorities and activities of the FAO and WOAH
- Importance of aligning the regional ME framework with the global framework
- Plan ME framework upfront when developing regional strategy!

ASF Kills pigs campaign


Implemented at strategic opportunities throughout the year to facilitate dissemination of tools on social media channels and amplify impact of messages

A disease called African swine fever is currently affecting pig populations and having socio-economic impact on families that depend on the park industry, worldwide. This

Do not carry pigs or pork products. If you do, declare them to the port authorities.

On land:

Do not visit farms unless strictly necessary.

Do not hunt wild pigs, it you are in regular contact with domestic pigs.

Help us save pigs and protect farmers by not spreading African swine feve

Other developments: vaccine guidelines and genomic platform

- Under Cooperative Agreement with USDA-ARS, engaged consultant to propose guidelines on the manufacture of safe and efficacious ASF vaccines
- Precursor for standards in the ASF chapter of the Terrestrial Manual
- Series of consultations with vaccine groups and regulators to build consensus





- Open-access genomic platform for ASFV sequences
- Harmonised bioinformatics workflow enable collation of high-quality ASFV genetic data
- Facilitate understanding of outbreak patterns, routes of spread, identification and tracking of natural viz vaccine-derived variants

Improving Veterinary Services: PVS Pathway

 WOAH flagship capacity building platform for the sustainable improvement of national Veterinary Services, through the Performance of Veterinary Services (PVS) pathway

Empowers Veterinary Services by providing them a comprehensive understanding of their strengths and

weaknesses

• 4 fundamental components, with critical competencies under each:

- Human, physical and financial resources
- Technical authority and capability
- Interaction with stakeholders
- Access to markets
- PVS Evaluation Specific Content for ASF:
 - Critical competencies adapted to capture ASF-specific content
